American friends are worried that gay marriage might be cancelled.

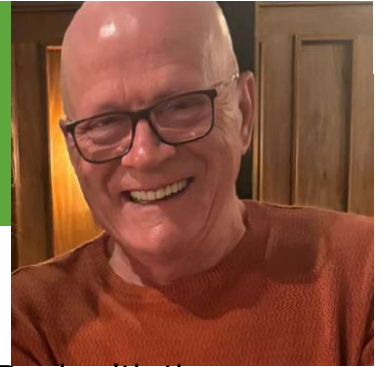
Australian friends who are Jewish and totally against Netanyahu, are worried about the rise of antisemitism.

Queensland Health has confirmed a second Australian case of the Clade I strain of Mpox, this time in Brisbane.

Detected in a patient from the Metro South Hospital and Health Service region, the case is believed to have been acquired overseas. This is now only the second confirmed case in Australia.

Mpox strain detected in Brisbane

Health Minister Tim Nicholls addressed public concerns, noting the limited risk of wider exposure.

“Contact tracing has been occurring, and the community can be assured that exposure to [others] has been very limited and the public should not be concerned,” he said.

Clade I Mpox has been far less common in Australia than Clade II, which has made up the majority of recent cases. Since the beginning of 2024, Queensland alone has recorded 135 confirmed Clade II Mpox cases, with most acquired locally.

Clade I, however, has been circulating more widely in parts of central and eastern Africa, with more than 30,000 cases reported. It reached Australia earlier this year via an overseas traveller in New South Wales.

Mpox was officially declared a global health emergency by the World Health Organisation (WHO) in August 2024 when they declared it a public health emergency of international concern, its highest level of alarm.

Mpox, formerly referred to as monkeypox, presents initially with flu-like symptoms with fever, headache, fatigue, muscle aches and swollen lymph nodes followed by the appearance of a painful rash or lesions, often in the anogenital region. The virus is primarily transmitted through close or intimate contact and not easily transmissible outside of this.

The LGBTQIA+ community, particularly sexually active gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men (MSM), along with their partners remains at elevated risk. However, vaccinations are available and continue to be encouraged.

The vaccine is government funded and available across Australia through sexual health clinics and selected GPs.

It is recommended not only as post-exposure prophylaxis but also as a primary preventive measure for those planning international travel to areas with ongoing outbreaks.

In October last year ACON in NSW urged LGBTQIA+ residents to get the vaccine as case numbers in the state continued to surge.

Current advice stresses that “anyone who believes they may have mpox should contact a health facility, and inform staff before attending.”

Testing involves PCR swabs from lesions or anorectal or throat samples. Other conditions like herpes, syphilis and varicella should also be ruled out.

To minimise risk, individuals with suspected symptoms should isolate, cover any lesions and avoid contact until test results are confirmed.

With a second Clade I Mpox case now confirmed, the LGBTQIA+ community is urged to stay informed, access vaccinations, and seek early testing if symptoms arise.

What are the Men's Community Couch Conversations?

This is YOUR online space to learn, listen, share and be heard. Topics are guided by participants but may include loneliness, sexual health difficulties, stress, anxiety or depression.

What happens during these sessions?

These facilitated online group gatherings provide a safe place for men in similar circumstances to form connections, make friends and talk openly about their issues.

What's the benefit of attending?

Men's Community Couch Conversations provide:

- a safe space free of judgement where gay men's privacy and vulnerability are treated with the utmost respect and understanding.
- connection with others who have similar issues or interests.
- a voice that promotes social interaction.
- an opportunity to help others as 10% of fees from every session are donated back to organisations assisting Men's Mental Health.

Who runs it?

Shaun, our facilitator, is a registered Counsellor with the Australian Counselling Association. He has dealt with many complicated issues, and as a gay man coming out later in life, he understands many difficulties men need to discuss on the couch.

How much is it and what does the price include?

Each session is only \$19.95 per person.

1.5 hours of group connection (limit of 15 participants) with a nationally qualified counsellor. Price includes a complimentary copy of 'The Couch Commentary' which includes tips and hints on the topic that was discussed during the session. Each participant receives a 10% discount on their first 1-on-1 online Counselling session at Bent Couch Counselling.

Boook Review

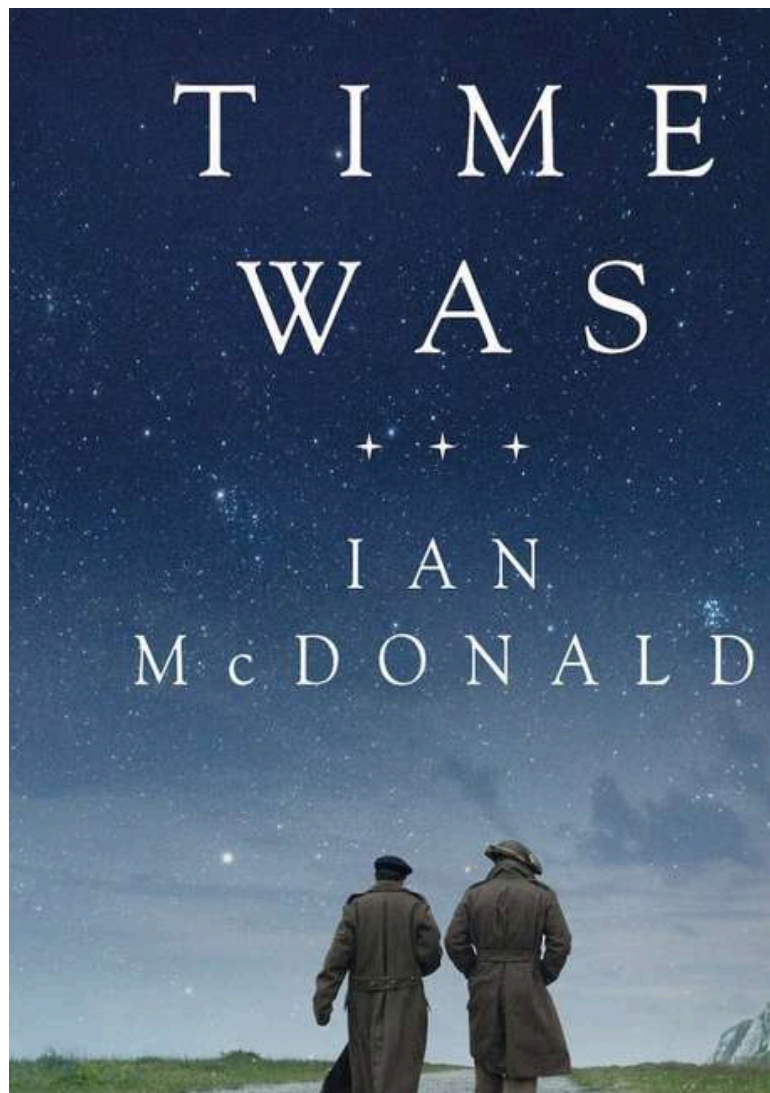
This book has been described as “A love story stitched across time and war.”

Letters to Vernon

The local postmaster sought advice from higher-ups on whether Vernon should be allowed to keep his mailbox, worried that it would be used for homosexual acts. Vernon replied that would be very difficult to perform a homosexual act in a mailbox.

A police detective also warned the local paper off running Marshall's classified ad advertising the PO box. Marshall arranged an interview with the officer to push his case, and won. The newspaper ran his ads again and the fledgling organisation took flight.

It was five years before the first Sydney Mardi Gras. Dianne Minns, the co-chair of First Mardi Inc and one of the original 78ers, said Marshall was "very lucky he was able to take out an ad".

"I think it was very brave of Vernon to do that newsletter, and very lucky that he got to use the PO box – there were other gay and lesbian organisations at the time who didn't have that luxury," Minns says.

Vernon distributed one copy of his newsletter in March 1973. No further editions have been found. It's not clear whether he began writing under another pen name, or stopped writing entirely. He died in 1984, a few months before homosexuality was decriminalised in [New South Wales](#).

The Tamworth librarian Jody Ekert learned Marshall's story when she was working on the regional city's first Pride Fair Day and a local journalist handed her an article from the [December 1972 Camp Ink newsletter](#), which interviewed Marshall about his PO box.

A few years later, locked down with Covid in a cabin on a cruise ship earlier this year, Ekert began thinking about Marshall again.

"I was like 'I'm so isolated, is it possible to get more isolated?'," she says.

Then she thought of Marshall. "That dude that you read the article about? That's gotta be one of the most isolated people: in the 70s, in Tamworth, trying to get something going," she says.

When Ekert came home, she decided to [start the Hey Vernon project](#) to carry on Marshall's mission and provide a point of connection for people struggling with their identity, especially in rural and regional Australia. She revived the PO box.

Ekert, herself a member of the LGBTQ+ community, says the anonymity of the mail box is appealing.

The Tamworth accountant set up a PO Box for his LGBTQ+ liberation movement in 1972. Fifty years later, the mailbox has been revived

In Tamworth in 1972, the 62-year-old accountant Vernon Marshall took out ads in the local paper to advertise a support group he'd started.

Marshall was gay. He had lived through Nazi Germany and immigrated to Australia, landing in Tamworth in the 1950s. He rented a post office box to give supporters and attenders a place to write to, in lieu of giving his home address.

That group was called the Camp-Gay Liberation Movement Tamworth and the newsletter was provocatively called Coming-Out. Though short-lived, it was one of the earliest LGBTQ+ organisations in regional Australia.
